CONCURRENT FUNCTIONS GRANT - PARISH SERVICES SCHEME

Up to now the parishes in the Maidstone Borough Council (MBC) area have received a grant to cover services undertaken by parishes which in the town/urban area would be carried out by MBC itself. It is recognised that during the last few years MBC has been operating under severe financial constraint and it has had little option but to review all its expenditure very closely. Therefore with this in mind MBC first proposed to phase out the current grant based system and replace it with a service based Parish Services Scheme.

The notice given by MBC to phase out the grant was initially far too short and we successfully managed to delay this until financial year 2013/14 and retain the same level of grant for 2012/13. In the meantime MBC continued to promote their Parish Services Scheme. Staplehurst has worked closely with the Kent Association of Local Councils (KALC) and is part of the KALC Review Team. Unfortunately, in spite of discussions taking more than two years we have not reached agreement with MBC. In our view the proposed Parish Services Scheme is seriously flawed. KALC has put forward an alternative proposal which it considered met MBC's key objectives, but to date this has not been

accepted. MBC seem intent on negotiating with each individual parish and putting parishes in a position where they would have to compete for a share of the budget of the MBC department agreeing the service. In our view this would fundamentally alter the relationship between one tier of local government i.e. the parishes and another tier of local government i.e. MBC. We also consider that MBC's proposal is unnecessarily bureaucratic and time consuming.

The parishes believe that they are being treated unfairly by MBC which could leave parishes seriously underfunded for some of the services they provide.

We are continuing to try to reach agreement with MBC. However, failure to do so could be serious for the parishes and lead either to services being discontinued or major increases in their precepts. As part of this process KALC is proposing that each of its member Parish Councils initiate a petition that will be collated and presented to MBC'S full Council by Maidstone KALC at the earliest opportunity; and if necessary this will be supported by a poll. It is our intention to enclose a copy of the petition notice with this edition of the Village Update; if this proves impractical we shall take steps to ensure all residents will have an opportunity to give their approval.

STAPLEHURST HEALTH CENTRE

Since the Health Centre opened in 2008 the medical services have been provided by Malling Health on a 5 year Alternative Provider Medical Services (APMS) contract which comes to an end in April 2013. The Primary Care Trust (PCT) want to go out to tender to determine who will provide the service from 2013 onwards. Malling Health will be prepared to bid for the contract provided they consider the terms and conditions to be feasible. It is possible that another provider could win the tender and this would result in a new provider at the Health Centre although the

doctors, nurses and administrators would have their employment rights protected under TUPE. The Parish Council and the Patient Participation Group are seeking a meeting with the PCT and an opportunity, (possibly at a public meeting) for the patients to have their say in who should be running their health centre, in the same way as they did before Malling Health were awarded the contract.

It is important that the PCT realise that they have a duty to listen to the patients and provide them with the service that they need.

The Committee worked their socks off to get sponsors in order to meet basic costs, booking excellent professional bands, staging and expert sound and lighting technicians that did not come cheap. SERGEANT R C FITZGERALD RAFVR

Some of you may already be aware that local military historian Ted Sergison has found out quite by chance that Sgt Fitzgerald's name is not on our WW2 memorial. The Sergeant lived and worked in Staplehurst for 4 years before enlisting and it was simply a tragic set of unfortunate circumstances that led to his name not being included when the memorial was first commissioned. As soon as the Parish Council heard of this and confirmed the facts it started to explore how we could rectify the situation. The decision has been made to completely replace the central panel of the memorial and have it re-

written by a professional sign writer to include the Sergeant's name in correct alphabetical order and this work is now in hand. It is hoped that a service can be held in due course to rededicate this memorial in his memory and we will let the community know when this has been arranged. Whilst investigating how best to correct the WW2 memorial it was noticed that there were several errors and omissions on the WW1 memorial. The Parish Council have arranged for these to be corrected at the same time as the work on the WW2 memorial is undertaken. The Council is also planning a project to mark the centenary of the start of the First World War and an article giving information about how you can get involved will be in the September issue of the Parish Magazine, on the council website and elsewhere.

CHAIRMAN'S REPORT

A lot has taken place since the last Update. Despite the vagaries of the British weather the Jubilee celebrations were a great success and I should like to place on record our thanks to the Jubilee Committee and all those involved in organising this event; without their efforts none of this would have been possible. We have also held a major event at our skate park. As many will know we planned to hold this UpRockin event last year, but the adverse weather conditions forced us to cancel it at the last minute. Nevertheless we started to plan for this year's event almost immediately. The weather was much kinder to us and the event which was run in conjunction with MBC was extremely successful. We are already starting to plan for next year. The skate park has proved to have been an important facility which has significantly benefited our community and we are now looking at the possibility of developing it further. Our thanks go to Elaine Downton, Cllr Paul Butcher and Sarah Shearsmith of MBC for the work they have put in to make this event possible. We have now obtained planning permission to install the Stryker security

camera at Jubilee Field. This was always the planned destination for the camera which is currently installed at Market Street. However, since the Market Street installation has proved to have been very successful we are currently looking into the possibility of acquiring a third camera, which although it would be based in Market Street, could be used elsewhere if needed.

We recognise that the maintenance and cleaning of the Parade continues to generate concern. MBC has completed the outstanding repairs and has now handed over responsibility for cleaning and maintenance to the owners. The Parade, even though it is privately owned, remains a public space and plays a key role in our community. Staplehurst Parish Council will continue to monitor the situation carefully and will use all reasonable endeavours to ensure the Parade is maintained and cleaned to a high standard.

Finally, we continue to work with the Maidstone Area of the Kent Association of Local Councils (KALC) to try to resolve our differences with MBC regarding the Parish Services Scheme; and Staplehurst Parish Council is taking a lead role. There could be considerable financial implications for parishes and rural areas in general if these differences remain unresolved.
