

PARISH COUNCIL NEWS FROM THE PAST (3)

Third edition already of this section. As stated before, we are very grateful to the Staplehurst Society who have kindly shared documents which were originally collated by Ron Hegarty in 1994 as part of the Centenary of this Parish Council. The reader will observe that some things never change. In this edition, speeding is the common issue that links us to our past. 18th June 1912 – Agreed that the words “Fire Engine Station” be painted on the notice and that the keys were available at Mr. Lavender’s shop in High Street. (This can be seen on photographs of the shed which The Staplehurst Society have in their archive). The PC were responsible for all items needed by the brigade – hoses, buckets, oils for the machine – and the insurance of the firemen when they were called to extinguish a fire. Clerk to ask Kent Insurance company if the sum of £3.00 for the premium was sufficient to cover the firemen who were only employed by the PC when called out to a fire!

15th April 1913 – Annual Parish Meeting – The Council were still discussing whether hydrants should be fixed to the water main in the Parish for use in case of fire.

5th May 1913 – Vote of thanks given to Mr. Williams Hoare “for the able manner in which he had presided since the formation of the PC in 1894”.

12th August 1913 – A letter from a resident complained of the annoyance to residents due to motor traffic through the village. The Clerk was instructed to write to KCC to request “that a special speed limit be fixed more specially to the heavy motor traffic passing through the village and that steps be taken to deal with the offenders who exceed the speed to the danger of the public”. (Nothing changes!)

8th August 1914 – KCC requested the PC to convene a meeting relating to “the existing state of affairs with a view to providing in each parish a Special Constable to be employed for the protection of life and property to act without pay”. (The day the war broke out – The Great War 1914-18).

3rd September 1914 – The Chairman reported that a public meeting had been held at which Special Constables had been appointed and that they had commenced their duties. The PC to purchase as many lamps for the Constables as they think necessary, also note books.

20th January 1915 – SE & CR to be advised at the extremely dangerous level of the platform at Staplehurst Station, it being much too low for persons alighting from the trains.

The Parish Council Chairman, Councillor Castro and four volunteers attended a reception to receive this Award. Up to 90 volunteers stepped in and provide support to around 8% of the population of our Parish. They even provided some sporadic help to individuals and families of neighbouring villages. COMMUNITY MEETING

The Parish Council held a public meeting on the 28th September at Staplehurst primary school. It was very well attended. Our guest speaker was Chief Inspector Gary Woodward from Kent Police. Cllr Paddy Riordan asked questions relating to policing issues: speeding, parking, unregistered cars, antisocial behaviour, shoplifting, arson and criminal damage. He said that our community paid in the region of £600,000 from Council tax towards policing and felt that the people of Staplehurst didn't consider they were getting value for money and indeed a much more visible police presence should be seen in the village. Many residents and local business people spoke, raising other issues with Chief Inspector Woodward, some of which were quite concerning. There was a very strong feeling amongst residents that the police were not being proactive to their approach to crime in Staplehurst. Chief Inspector Woodward offered some immediate ideas, including putting Staplehurst on a red route for police cars returning from calls, to travel through the village and visit problematic areas. The Parish Council feel that there has already been a marked improvement in relation to policing since the meeting. We will continue to monitor the situation. The matter of the closure of High Weald Academy was also strongly discussed. The Parish Council made it clear that they would be supporting residents. The Parish Council continue to be actively involved with all parties in relation to this issue. Road safety matters were discussed and information was provided by one of our very able Road safety group members. On a positive note, no other matters were raised with the Parish Council, so it looks like the attendees felt that we are doing quite a good job! It was mentioned by a member of the public that it was clear a lot of hard work goes on behind the scenes at the PC and we are very pleased that this is recognised by our residents.

STAPLEHURST MEN'S SHED

We have restarted our weekly Thursday morning meetings at Staplehurst Youth Club Hut (beside the Village Centre building). Currently these are only between 10am until 12pm (subject to review).

The Staplehurst Men's Shed is a place where men from Staplehurst and surrounding villages come together to socialise, play pool, scrabble, share ideas and skills, join the choir, participate on practical projects and make new friends. Tea and coffee are provided. Current Membership ages range from 50 -80+.

SPEEDWATCH

Speedwatch is a Parish Council funded and Kent Police approved scheme to help keep Staplehurst residents safe. We monitor the speeds of vehicles on our roads. Just our presence in hi-vis jackets has an excellent beneficial effect. Persistent offenders and those exceeding speed limits dramatically are sent letters by the police. The more evidence we send in, the more likely it will be that police will set up enforcement positions in Staplehurst. In September speeders were given points on their licences and a stolen car was recovered.

To volunteer (aged 18+) to give time to this scheme, first visit 'csw online'. There is a presentation and safety training to watch. Then roadside training in Staplehurst will see you added to our small team.

WIMPEY FIELDS - A GREEN PLACE OF OUR OWN

Mention the name to some residents of the village and they will go misty-eyed with memories. "Oh yes, I played there as a child and my children ran through it when they were young." will be the response. It seems that growing up in Staplehurst is entwined with fond memories of the place. It's only fair then that newcomers to the village be introduced to this beautiful green space - now owned and managed by Staplehurst Parish Council.

With this in mind the Greener Staplehurst Group (a sub-committee of the Parish Council) hosted two walks, led by Peter Spearink, on a Sunday in early September. Newcomers to the village were introduced to the Wimpey Fields while long established residents learnt more about its history, path names, future plans and current management.

The site was given over to the Parish Council by Taylor Wimpey in 2017, for the conservation of nature. It came with a management plan to help maximise biodiversity, including protecting the pond habitat of the great crested newt (now on the IUCN red list of endangered species). The site is a haven for all sorts of wildlife including birds, butterflies, adders and foxes.

While the area has been managed by groups of volunteers and the Payback team in the past, at present some areas have become (temporarily) overgrown. However, a new plan of work, is now being devised to bring the Fields back to their best.

Staplehurst is SO lucky to have this amazing green space where we can walk, breathe and enjoy nature.

MEMORIALS IN STAPLEHURST

The main war memorial is the actual St George's chapel in the south-eastern corner of the church. The names of all WW1 and WW2 dead are on two plaques inside the chapel. We also have three other WW2 memorials in the parish. All the work of the late Ted Sergison, who was our village military historian. Most impressive of these is the American and Canadian memorial in Chickenden Lane. This records the fact that Canadian pilots worked up this forward landing ground before the USAAF took over. Sadly over 20 airmen died flying out of Staplehurst and are now on our roll of honour.

In Grave Lane there is a small cross recording the site of a crashed Hurricane flown by Pilot Officer Clifton. Part of this memorial is a recovered piece of the engine. Lastly in the station booking hall there is a splendid brass plaque to the memory of Flight Officer Doutrepoint, whose Hurricane was shot down and crashed into the station killing the booking clerk as well. There are two small footpaths named for these two men. We will tell you the sad story of Flight Sgt Fitzgerald in the next Village Update. There is a common misconception: the memorial at the crossroads is to local Marian Martyrs and has nothing to do with the war memorials, we will also learn about in the future.
