ART SHED REPORT - 2025

The Art Shed was formed in October 2024 by a small group of six friends who share a likeminded interest in art.

We feel lucky to have found a place where we can meet once a week and get creative.

Between us we use a variety of mediums for our art such as watercolours, acrylics, oils and inks. Two of our group have even started writing and illustrating a children's book.

We do not consider ourselves as serious artists by any stretch of the imagination, but we do enjoy getting together to share our passion. We find it very relaxing, taking time out from our otherwise busy lives.

Once a month one of us will choose a topic and we challenge ourselves to paint something under that heading, each producing a different interpretation of what was chosen.

We contribute a nominal fee weekly and this enables us to purchase commonly used materials such a paper and pencils, including tea and coffee.

We have been also been able to invite a tutor so that we can have help and guidance with various different techniques, and are hoping to do this on a quarterly basis.

We prefer a more relaxed approach to our common interest in art and collectively we have produced some lovely and interesting pieces of artwork.

BRIDGE CLUB – May 2025

Staplehurst Bridge Club is still meeting at the Cricket and Tennis Club on Friday afternoons. We have a small and very loyal group of players but are in need of new members to enable the club to flourish.

We are able to offer lessons to those who would like to learn this fascinating game and we are happy to welcome beginners to our Friday sessions.

We play duplicate bridge in a friendly environment and uniquely we do not insist that members arrive with a partner - we have several movements which enable us to provide a competitive game for however many players are present. We play at 2pm on Friday afternoons at the Cricket and Tennis Club in Frittenden Road and all new members will be most welcome.

Since we last submitted a report to the Parish Council we have undergone a number of minor changes.

In February 2024 Community Money Advice – our umbrella organization, released a new case management system. This meant the transferal of all of our cases onto the new system and then the task of familiarizing ourselves with new layouts and information fields. The new system is good but has taken a bit of getting used to.

During 2024 we were in discussion with the leaders and trustees of Staplehurst Free Church regarding the future of the center. During the Covid pandemic we were able to obtain grants towards our general running costs but since then we have struggled to obtain further grants and our funds were running low. Whilst we are always grateful for the financial support we receive from the Parish Council, it is not enough to cover the main costs of insurance and affiliation to CMA. Since opening in 2009 the Debt Advice Centre has sat as an independent body but not a registered charity. After some discussion we made the decision to come under the umbrella of Staplehurst Free Church. This way we can be just one part of the various community projects run by the church. The church, as a registered charity, is more likely to meet the eligibility criteria set by grant making bodies. Grants received for community projects can be used to fund the existing projects as well as the Debt Advice Centre. So far this has made very little difference to the running of the center, except our insurance and indemnity cover is now part of the church insurance package. We hope that raised awareness of the Centre, as it becomes more a part of the work of the church, may generate interest and new volunteers to continue the work.

With regards to work with clients, our mode of operation has always been to see clients face to face, work with them towards a debt solution and then continue supporting them for as long as they require. In 2024 we finally closed the case of a client who originally came to us in 2016. This client had seen constantly changing income and family situations, meaning her repayment plan was being regularly reviewed. She finally became debt free in the summer of 2024 and we were able to close her case knowing that she will continue managing her finances wisely to the best of her ability.

A number of our recent clients have had significant mental health challenges and this can mean the work is slow, as we wait for information to be found, forms to be filled in and appointments to be attended, sometimes needing to factor in the shift patterns of attending support workers. New training that we undertook in 2023, to comply with the FCA Consumer Duty rules, has been put to good use. We now have to show how we have adapted our practices in order to ensure we provide for the needs of those with physical or mental challenges and ensure that we are showing care and compassion to vulnerable clients.

Staplehurst Free Church is holding a Garden Party on 12th July, where there will be displays to showcase the various activities and community projects of the church. We anticipate having a stand at this event. Come along and chat to us if you want to know more.

Staplehurst Community Centre

Thank you to the local groups and hirers of the Community Centre. It's good to know that the halls continue to be used by a range of people for regular classes as well as private hires for celebrations of birthdays and anniversaries. We have our regular classes of Kick boxing, dance classes, Yoga, Pilates and the ELS toddlers' group, as well as the monthly Market and Sarah's Sound therapy. We have also welcomed Sandra's bi weekly Healing circle. There has been increased use for training and conference purposes.

We have begun making small changes to internal areas, such as electrical changes to be able to implement improved connectivity between the halls for future use. We also now have WIFI in the building which we hope will improve the experience for our visitors. It is pleasing to note that over the last five years the trustees have worked hard to ensure that the building is being managed in such a way that it pays for itself. To enable the agreed improvements to take place, however, will require substantial fundraising, which we have begun to do.

A big thank you to all who use the halls as well as our volunteers, working hard behind the scenes, making things happen.

Community Hub Afternoon Tea Club

Our club, which is self-funding, runs every Monday, excluding bank holidays with a break over the summer holidays. We meet at the McCabe Centre between 2 - 4 pm. We currently have 27 regular members and have space for three more. The club is very sociable and our members enjoy a good chat. We have one volunteer driver for which we are very grateful.

Last year was a busy year for the club.

We celebrated valentines with red roses and chocolates, held an Easter themed competition, with lots of amazing entries, Rachel Callister, kindly judged this event for us. The members each took home an Easter egg.

We visited Hawkhurst Fish Farm for scones and tea.

Several musicians visited throughout the year to entertain us, and guide dog Orwell also paid a visit.

In November to celebrate bonfire night we visited the King's Head for a meal. The staff looked after us very well.

In December we held our annual Christmas party. A lovely afternoon tea with a raffle and each member took home a Christmas gift. Our thanks to the Events Group for their kind donation to this event and also to Crouch's butchers for their generous raffle prize.

This coming year is looking busy too with several events already in the pipeline.

STAPLEHURST EMERGENCY HELP TEAM 2024/5

The SEHT remain busy and active behind the scenes. All the while we seem quiet means there are no emergencies going on!

Our application for charity status has been submitted and we await their decision.

We had a busy Autumn & Winter with a number of storms knocking down trees and generating flash flooding. Our chainsaw experts were certainly put to good use.

The Parish Flood Plan has been updated and the Resilience Plan reviewed.

SEHT were privileged to have supported the Tractor Run providing first aiders, crowd control and 'bucketeers'.

In April 2025 SEHT attended the KALC Resilience forum and it was a great opportunity to meet in person the people who have delivered the online trainings, and those that have supported us through email. It was also great to know that we are leading the way with our resilience plans.

May 2025 SEHT attended the Kent Resilience Forum Exhibition at Detling Showground. A real honour to have been invited as we hosted a stand amongst key players such as Kent Police, Kent Fire & Rescue, Environment Agency, RAYNET, Search & Rescue etc

VE Day – SEHT has the honour of lighting the beacon as well as running a stall to raise some muchneeded funds.

2 more face to face meetings with KRF are scheduled in the coming months and meetings with neighbouring Parish Councils to assist them in getting their resilience plans up to date.

STAPLEHURST FOOTPATH GROUP REPORT

Staplehurst Footpath Group has been active in the village for the past fifty years or so. It currently has around thirty members; casual walkers are also welcome.

The walking year, May 2024 to April 2025, saw it undertake 13 walks, with 31 individual participants walking 631 miles between them!

The Group's regular walks are on the second Sunday each month, plus a Saturday evening in June for the longest day. Other walks are also sometimes arranged. They are a mixture of local walks from the village and from other locations, such as the North Downs or Romney Marsh.

The wetter summer and winter were offset in the past few months by fine weather for walking, this being reflected in good recent turnouts. The Staplehurst mud in winter is legendary!

The Group always welcomes new walkers and members, although we do not permit dogs on our walks as we regularly pass through farmland with animals.

Staplehurst Free Church – The year in review - 2024

In 2024 we celebrated 55 years as a community church for Staplehurst.

Our social, health and wellbeing activities have continued to expand alongside our usual services. The building is now in use each day of the week as follows: -

- Mondays Debt Advice Centre, Men's Walking Group, SFC Choir
- Tuesdays Friends Together, Warm Hub, Community Fridge, Home Groups (off site)
- Wednesdays Prayer Meeting, Community Fridge, Home Groups (on site)
- Thursdays FreeBees, Community Fridge, Mixed Badminton
- Fridays Pastoral Care Meeting, Interest Group, Ladies Badminton, Youth24, Worship Group Rehearsals
- Saturdays Community Fridge, Family Fun, and ad hoc Social Events
- Sundays Church Services, Sharing Lunches and Social Events (occasional)

Key developments in the year have been as follows:

- In person attendance at Church services continued to increase with 110 regular attendees and several new families attending. Online broadcasting has also been maintained with over 2000 views in the year.
- We also celebrated 8 baptisms in the year.
- The Community Fridge has seen almost 6000 visits in 2024 a 26% increase driven by the continued cost-of-living crisis. This initiative is part of the Shepherd's Pantry portfolio a food-insecurity community support programme which started during the Covid pandemic to reclaim food from retailers and suppliers that would otherwise go to waste or is surplus to their requirements. This is then made available to the public, particularly those in financial hardship at no cost. The Fridge is open at varying times over 4 days a week with over 20 volunteers in the team collecting food, undertaking stock control and welcoming and informally supporting visitors. Other building users are invited to make use of the

Community Fridge on other days. Our busiest month of the year was August which we believe is related to the school holidays.

- The Winter Welcome Space became the Warm Welcome Hub opening up our premises to local people and to provided warmth, company and refreshments. During the coldest months free hot soup and rolls were also provided. Up to 40 people are served each week.
- The FreeBees support sessions for new parents continue to be popular. Two ageappropriate groups operate on Thursday mornings and afternoons with a waiting list in place for the morning session. Places are freed up as parents return to work, so over time we are able to provide support to many families who benefit from the help and encouragement given by the sessions hosts and other parents with shared experiences. At any onetime we have up to 66 children registered with us.
- In the autumn we concluded our training programme the 'Emmaus Project' helping us plan and deliver a coordinated programme of community engagement events. In the last year we have held a free barn dance, a free quiz night, a Santas Grotto, a summer music event and an Anniversary celebration. Further events are planned for the coming year.
- Also, in the Autumn we launched Youth24 an interactive fun evening for young people of secondary school age. Sessions run on the second and fourth Fridays during term time.
- Following his successful first year with us our Church Leader, Peter Brook has increased his hours and will now work four days per week in the coming year.
- In late June we had solar panels and back up batteries fitted thanks to a generous grant from Maidstone Borough Council. This has helped reduce our electricity bills, reduced our carbon emissions and we are sharing any excess electricity generated with the Staplehurst community.

One of the cornerstone activities of the Church is providing financial support for a variety of thirdparty charitable organisations and we are pleased to be able to report we have sustained this activity through the continuous generous donations of our members and regular attendees. This past year we have had a particular focus on practical relief work in Ukraine, Palestine/Israel and Darfur. Rent-free office space and funding support was also provided to Staplehurst's Debt Advice Centre – who helped clients manage over £250,000 of personal debt.

FRIENDS OF ALL SAINTS STAPLEHURST

The Friends of All Saints was set up over 30 years ago as an independent Charity whose objectives are to raise funds to help maintain, repair, restore preserve, improve, for the benefit of the public, the fabric of All Saints Church.

Over the years we have supported many projects, the first being the restoration of the bells and the most recent the reconstruction of the Turret.

We hold many events during the year to which everyone is welcome to attend. We started 2024 with our very popular Brain Game in March which saw 11 teams testing their brains.

Being our 30th year we made our AGM in May a bit of a party to celebrate all that we had achieved in those years. In June we held a concert led by Steven Higgins that saw over 100 people enjoy a fabulous evening of music. In July we were hosted by Adam Houghton for a cream tea and watching the Gauge 1 trains in his garden. Some of us walked across the fields and we were blessed with fine weather. In September we had a croquet afternoon with the added delight of a cream tea. In October we had an Autunm tea party with some parlor games to add to the fun. A Christmas evening with supper and a good old sing song of carols completed the year.

Hi Kent Social Group

Our Social Group for people in Staplehurst who live with hearing loss has been running for three years now and meets once a month at the United Reformed Church. Attendance varies in the region of 8 to 20 people per meeting and the group is welcomed as a valuable resource that enables people to share experiences and coping strategies with others who also have hearing loss. Two local volunteers help to run the group's meetings.

Hi Kent arranges guest speakers for most meetings, in consultation with the group. Topics include from dealing with potential scams, general finance matters, first aid as well as interesting talks from group members on their careers. The group also has updates from Hi Kent on the free help that we can provide to help people in their daily lives. These include talks and demonstrations of assistive equipment and the benefits of learning to lipread. Hi Kent is also able to signpost people to other local support agencies.

Staplehurst Interest Group

Founded in 2002, this group has met weekly about a thousand times. We welcome all to enjoy a couple of hours of friendship through laughter, activities, illustrated talks from speakers and occasional visits. We meet in the Free Church in Station Road for a 10am start on Friday mornings for a cuppa and chat which is a great way to widen your circle of friends.

Members suggest the programme's content so in the last year we've tried to solve a murder mystery and whether facts were true or false; visited Cranbrook Museum and Bateman's; had

Countdown and Bluffers sessions and a 60s music quiz; had fascinating talks from members of the Photographic Society, on Canterbury, Fraud Prevention, Parks, Leeds Castle; played dominoes, beetle and board games; tried to write short stories and poems; made cracker boxes; discussed how people came to be in Staplehurst, pets and things that have inspired us, along with many, many more.

Paddock Wood and District Lions Club

<u>McCabe Day Centre</u> <u>Report on Lunch Clubs for Staplehurst Parish Council</u> <u>Annual Parish Meeting May 2025</u>

The Lunch Clubs at McCabe Day Centre provide lunches for McCabe Close and Kirkman Court residents and Staplehurst residents over the age of 60.

The Thursday Lunch Club meets at the McCabe Day Centre every week, except for a shor break at Christmas, and during August to mid-September. We offer a freshly cooked two-course meal with tea and coffee for £4 (including a raffle ticket). It is a chance for members to come together and to meet and make new friends, as well as enjoying a nourishing meal.

Transport is provided for the less able, at a cost to them of $\pounds 2$, which we put towards the cost of hiring the Weald Club for the Disabled minibus.

We also provide a Sunday lunch once a month, usually on the second Sunday of the month. This is always a roast dinner, together with dessert, and costs members £5 (again including raffle ticket). Sadly we are unable to provide transport for these meals.

When we can, we arrange special events for the members. One of the most popular being the day trip down to Eastbourne by coach every year. We subsidise the cost of this for members, and any family or friends they would like to bring along, and it is a popular outing, allowing opportunities for fish and chips, and ice creams, a little shopping, a good stroll along the promenade or even all of these.

We also celebrate Christmas each year with a party, and turkey lunch with all the trimmings. Generally we bring in an entertainer of some sort to make the afternoon even more festive. In fact, we definitely enjoy a party when we can find the opportunity. Over the last year we have taken members to Millbrook for a trip around the garden centre, and a tea and cake in the café; and then in April, we made a tea party at McCabe with a "proper" tea (sandwiches, scones and cake) together with an entertainer. These last two events were paid for from a generous legacy from one of our previous members.

We are also well supported by businesses in the village, and are very grateful for the support we get from Crouch the butcher's and the Adam and Eve Farm Shop. Spar has provided many

vouchers which has allowed us to acquire a lot of raffle prizes for free. Last, but not least, the Newlyn Trust charity has funded food safety training for our volunteers, to make sure we keep our members safe. We thank all involved, it makes us feel cherished to benefit from so much support.

All of the helpers (cooks, helpers, drivers and escorts) are volunteers, and help us to generate a cheerful, welcoming time for everyone. We hold our Annual General Meeting in September, and anyone interested in the work of the Day Centre is welcome to attend.

Staplehurst Men's Shed Spring 2025.

The Men's Shed began 2024 holding its meetings in the Scout Hut and again we are extremely grateful to Bill Best and the Staplehurst Scouts for enabling this while the youth club was closed.

Following on from the completion of safety and other works carried out by the Parish Council on the Youth Club building, the Men's Shed were able to return there for their meetings at the end of May.

Many of the members of the group were involved in the complete repainting of the inside of the building. This proved to be a bigger project than anticipated but together with the other works the transformation has been remarkable. The building is now much brighter, lighter and more pleasant.

The Men's Shed is a social club that welcomes men of all ages from 18 years onwards and has been held in the Youth Club building (usually) on a Thursday morning for a good number of years.

We offer a warm friendly environment with unlimited tea and coffee, comfortable settees for a good chat and a laugh, plus a pool table and a number of table games such as scrabble and Mexican rules group dominos.

We are currently open between 10am and noon, although this could well be extended in the future if members so desire, as has occurred in the past.

Look in and see for yourself, you will not regret it!

The repainting of the youth club was one of only a few projects carried out by the group last year in part due to the fitness of our members. We would like to rekindle that aspect of the Shed, to run alongside the social side, and we would welcome new members interested in carrying out more practical activities or community work.

We would also be very happy to support and assist anyone or group interested in the establishment of a Men's Shed workshop here in Staplehurst.

Staplehurst Monarchs FC CIC (Senior Section)

This season has proved to be more of a rollercoaster than last. Our First Team have sadly not been able to replicate the success of 23/4, although they reached the semi-final of the Kent Intermediate Trophy. We will be rebuilding during the summer with a new management team, and look to achieve our 5-year plan in the future.

Our U23s have been working hard and the management team have built a solid squad who are competing well with the teams in their league. They have had several players called up to the first team, including 18-year-old Ollie Styles and 16-year-old Kester Jones – who has played for the club since he was in the Development Team aged 6 and still plays for the U18s. The U23s also have squad players brought though our junior section, proving the player pathway is working well.

Our women's team have also demonstrated their commitment to the player pathway, with former U18s players stepping up to the team, and former youth section players returning to football. The management team have reaped the benefits of their dedication, finishing our home fixtures with a superb win in front of a crowd of 50+ supporters.

We also added a Sunday team to our stable this year, comprising of last season's SMYFC U18s mixed in with former Staplehurst players to give experience of senior football. Currently looking like they will finish in the top 4 in the league, and with Ash Wright currently top goal scorer in all 3 divisions, they have undoubtedly had the most successful season with 2 cup finals, both staged at the Gallagher Stadium. The first, The President's B Cup, was played out in front of a huge crowd and sadly ended in heartbreak as they lost 9-8 on penalties. The second, the Kent Invitational Cup, will be played on 9 May against Cuxton U18s and we hope to bring the silverware home.

Our work in the community has continued through the season, including donations to the Shepherd's Pantry and several charity collections, and coaching sessions for Junior teams. We have offered a local young photographer the opportunity to work with our club photographer to gain valuable experience of sports photography. Most notably, we hosted the Inaugural Nigel Best Memorial Trophy at the Jubilee, in memory of our great friend who we sadly lost in 2023. Many former and current players took part, and we raised over £2500 for MacMillan Cancer Support. We hope to play this again this season.

We are also delighted to have formed a Community Interest Company (CIC) with our Junior section, bringing us back together as one club. This is vital for the club's future, and for the player pathway.

Planning permission for our much needed clubhouse was granted in November 2024 and we are working with the Parish Council to make this a reality. Without a proper clubhouse, the future of the club is not secure, and it will also be a fantastic community facility.

Staplehurst Monarchs Youth

This season we have 22 teams ranging in age from U7s to U21s including 6 girls' teams. We are also running 2 age groups of development football for U6s and U7s who are known as 'Mini Monarchs' through our partners 'Football Five Star'. Our players range in age from 5 to 48 (1 only!).

We are pleased to say that a number of our older boys played for the Men's U23s and even 1st team during the season. Same with the Women's team too. This is a defined policy for both seniors and juniors.

We continue to use social media notably Facebook and Instagram to publish the club's news. We also occasionally contribute information and photos to the Staplehurst Parish Magazine.

Both Jubilee Sports Field and Staplehurst School Field suffer from drainage problems and we struggled to play at either venue between December 2024 and March 2025. We decided it necessary to book alternative pitches in order to keep everyone playing which we managed to do on the whole.

Due to the commitment of our teams and parents we were able to play league matches at alternative venues such as Mote and South Park, Cornwallis Academy, Mangravet and Homewood.

In terms of results, we have had some notable successes on the pitch this season. Both our U8 Royals and U10 teams won their Autumn competitions with the U9s coming runners up. More recently both our U16 Girls and U12 Boys' teams have finished runners up in their respective league competitions.

With a few matches to go, our U14 Girls and U18 Boys have opportunities to win their respective leagues. 3 of our younger teams (U7s/U8s and U8 Royals) also have cup finals this Saturday 3rd May.

We continue to adopt a policy of 'Sport for All' to encourage young people in our area to get involved in sport.

We provide sport for more than 300 young people and their families. This wouldn't be possible without the commitment of our small dedicated committee, managers, coaches, parents, sponsors and the young people themselves. We would also like to thank Staplehurst Parish Council for their continued support together with the Jubilee Field Working Group.

The group of residents and parish councillors, who started the original work in 2021, are continuing to work towards a successful completion of the review process with the excellent assistance of our consultant to make sure we cross the T's and dot the I's! The public consultation held July 6, 2024, gave further feedback to support the recent Residents Survey. With the political

changes both at Maidstone and Westminster OUR Neighbourhood Plan becomes even more important as the push for more housing grows. The new plan, which if approved would run until 2038 is now at the stage where the final draft was approved and signed off by the Parish Council by 31 March, 2025.

The next stage is a statutory Pre-submission in accordance with the requirements of the Localism Act 2011 and Regulation 14 of the Neighbourhood Planning (General) Regulations 2012 (as amended). The consultation will run from Tuesday June 6, 2025 to Friday June 27, 2025. This will be an opportunity to give your views on the draft policy.

As always, we are grateful to the Parish Council for their ongoing support and to our consultant.

My thanks as always to the members of the group who have continued their hard work and commitment.

STAPLEHURST PHOTOGRAPHIC SOCIETY – 2025

It has been another busy year for the Staplehurst Photographic Society, both internally and externally to the club. The group meets every Friday evening in the Parish Rooms, from the beginning of September through to the end of May. The published programme always contains a mix of Talks, Workshops, Competitions and Fun Evenings for all levels of ability.

The membership has remained constant and bucks the trend compared with our much bigger rivals. However, we would welcome more photographers to join us. Many more images are now being taken on mobile phones, this has enabled us to give specific training in how to set up phones to take the best images and how to use free editing software to modify photos. The club has continued to offer monthly outings to a diverse selection of locations. The highlight of the season, undoubtably, was a private tour of the massive Victorian Crossness Pumping Station on the Thames at Abbey Wood. The group of 20 photographers had unhindered access to the building. Other locations visited also included Dungeness, the Tate Britain and East London Docks.

Externally the Society has competed well against the South-East's big clubs, coming second to Maidstone in the Marley Medallion Trophy and again only five points behind Maidstone, the eventual winners of the prestigious Kent County Photographic Association's Diamond Jubilee Trophy. We had exactly the same result in the annual Malling Battle of the Prints.

Internal competitions, both projected images and prints, have continued to attract large entry numbers. Many of these will be displayed at the SPS Annual Exhibition held in the Autumn at the United Reform Church. The next will be on 18th October 2025.



The Staplehurst Scout group has had another successful year creating adventure and learning for boys and girls in the village between 4 and 14 years old. It's impossible to fit everything we do into this report, but here are a few of the highlights.

Staplehurst Squirrels won the Kent Scouts Community Project Highly Commended Award and were picked to pilot the new Squirrels You Shape Badge. We had a visit from the RNLI to teach us about water safety. We also learnt about water pollution and the dangers to sea creatures. The Squirrels and Beavers had two sleepover events during the year and undertook a number of visits including a trip to the Rare Breeds farm, Lower Grange farm to GO NUTS! and still had time for a Chinese workshop and a trip to the pantomime.

As is the tradition with all Scout Groups, participation in the annual St George's Day parade and the Remembrance Day commemorations are an important part of scouting and we were pleased to march to the service held in the village.

Raising funds for others not so well off is also an important part of scouting and the Group raised £300 for Make a Wish and £250 for the Air Ambulance charities.

Our cubs and scouts had a combined week-long summer camp in Sevenoaks and learnt many outdoor living skills. All our sections have continued to encourage learning through our badges programme and by embracing the ethos of scouting and the values we uphold. Looking at the VE day 80th centenary commemorations, the scouts renovated the Sgt Fitzgerald memorial bench and we will renew the flags at the airfield memorial. The Cubs and scouts are also preparing a pop-up museum to display period photographs and artefacts.
